## **Session Seven**

## The rights of the child in international migration

Evidence shows that children are highly represented among migrant populations. Children are also affected by migration when their parent(s) or caregiver(s) migrate and children remain home under the care of other family members, including siblings, or under the care of family friends. Evidence also demonstrates that, while migration can enhance the respect, protection and fulfilment of the rights of the child and offer her/him new opportunities, it can also expose the child to various risks and child rights violations (UNICEF: <u>Uprooted</u>). With the right laws, policies and practices, however, such risks can be avoided or mitigated, and the positive impacts of migration for children can be maximised.

**Objective of the session**: Participants will learn about the international legal framework on the rights of the child and its implementation in the context of international migration. They will also hear about existing NGO good practices, challenges and ongoing work in addressing the identified challenges.
