Introduction

This paper presents a roadmap for the ICVA Asia and the Pacific (AP) Regional Hub, to support the Global ICVA 2030 Strategy.

Humanitarian Trends in Asia Pacific

Asia-Pacific is home to a complex mixture of multi-layered threats: conflict, fragility, internal displacement, social and economic vulnerability, environmental degradation and climate change. Its sub-regions rank amongst those most natural hazard-prone in the world. Despite rapidly transforming economies, the region is also marked by stark inequalities. An effective approach to mitigation and response requires an improved understanding of the linkages between risks, which requires going beyond a single hazard approach.

Asia Pacific is also a region that has excelled in humanitarian innovation. It's increasing ownership of response to natural hazards at the country level, use of technology and history of dealing with climate-related hazards has helped it cultivate expertise that is useful across and beyond the region. It has also meant though that the UN system is not the dominant means of coordination in the region. Members need to engage with a diverse range of coordination mechanisms some of which are government led or spearheaded by regional bodies such as ASEAN and SPC. Increasingly member states that affect humanitarian policy and aid delivery in the region sit within rather than outside the region and thus there is a need to increase ICVA's ability to facilitate collective advocacy efforts at the regional level.

Many countries within the region are also influential donors to the humanitarian system including South Korea, Japan, Australia and China. Harnessing their involvement and facilitating their understanding of the issues facing NGOs is critical to improving humanitarian outcomes for affected people.

Utilising ICVA's ways of working this regional strategy seeks to meaningfully contribute to the implementation of ICVA's 2030 strategy in a way that is meaningful for the region and harnesses the unique assets in the region.

Forced Migration (FM)

SSAR platform and regional coordination mechanisms on forced displacement. NGO understanding and engagement with the Afghanistan support platform remains low, although it has been initiated since 2018. This presents an opportunity to increase efforts at regional level to understand what opportunities there are for NGOs to be involved in the platform processes, particularly in light of the current Afghan situation and its potential broadening scope.	Further consultations with UNHCR carried out on the platform however have not been followed up, the Afghan crisis presents new opportunities, and we have members in all affected countries. Many of the Members States in the AP region are important actors in supporting humanitarian response in the region through diplomacy or direct aid.

Many NGOs struggle though to target them effectively a different advocacy environment, relationships and approach is required.

To support members to better position themselves to carry out collective advocacy towards member states in the region, particularly for displacement issues related to Myanmar/Bangladesh and Afghanistan, ICVA will help convene diverse NGO actors and partners in the region on issues of strategy/ approaches and thematic areas. Work should include other more traditional Regional Donors who have influence as well.

Activities may also include power analysis on select topics.

Co-organize regional consultations with UNHCR and APPRN ensuring solid involvement and contribution from NGOs and Refugee Led organizations.
